ENERGY PRICES REMAIN FAR **TOO HIGH FOR CUSTOMERS**

TD for Dublin South West Seán Crowe has said energy prices are still far too high for most people and must be cut to affordable levels.

Commenting on news that Bord Gáis Energy will cut gas and electricity prices from February 29th, Teachta Crowe said "Energy companies have announced price cuts recently, but they do not go far enough and prices remain much too high for most people. Families need a break from these unaffordable costs and need to see urgent action to slash prices further.

"While the recent price decreases are welcome, the reality is that customers remain squeezed. Yes prices are falling.

We cannot ignore the fact that even after the reduction, Bord Gáis Energy's electricity prices will remain around 90% above where they were in 2020, and gas prices are around double previous levels. "Ordinary workers and families continue to struggle under the weight of these sky-high costs. The level of arrears continues to grow and energy poverty remains high. Heating homes will remain exorbitantly expensive this winter, particularly as the reduction will not come into effect until it is over.

"The stark reality is that the price of gas and electricity here remains sky high for local customers. In fact, Irish energy

Psychology Service and 894 people are waiting on addiction services. Deputy Ward raised this with the Minister for Justice directly on the Oireachtas Committee Justice. Speaking for afterwards, Teachta Ward said "It is clear that from the information that I received from the Department of Justice that prisoners are not getting the vital mental health support that they need.

"As of January, 1,804 people are waiting for appointments with the Irish Prison Service Psychology Service and 894 people are waiting on addiction services. With the latest figures that I have, this represents 65% of the prison population waiting on mental health supports. "Psychologists in prisons treat a range of mental health issues including mood and anxiety disorders. neurotic and stress related disorders, disorders of personality and behaviour, Post Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD) including

complex PTSD, self-harm and suicidal behaviour, substance use. eating disorders, psychosis and schizophrenia, dementias, addiction. cognitive decline traumatic brain injuries, impulse disorders, and disorders of sexual preference.

"As you can see from the list of mental health issues that they are quite varied and complex. "The failure in getting timely mental health supports is in turn

on the rates of reoffending. "If a serious mental health difficulty such as acute psychosis is the root cause of an offence, then what hope is there for rehabilitation if the prisoner cannot access basic mental health services? "The end result often leads to reoffending upon release, which also leads to an increase in victims. We know that about 6 in 10 people reoffend within 3 years of their release. It is a vicious cycle which having a negative impact is being perpetuated by

governments' successive lack of investment and resource planning in both the Irish Prison Service and the mental health services in the wider community.

"For too long, the Irish justice system has been the gatekeeper for those experiencing mental health and or addiction difficulties. "If this Government is serious about helping prisoners and bringing down rates of reoffending then they must resource out prisons.'

CLLR GILLIGAN WELCOMES TAY LANE RATHCOOLE FOOTBRIDGE REFURB

Local Councillor Trevor Gilligan recently welcomed news on the Tay Lane footbridge refurbishment works, he said "Local residents have waited a long time for this upgrade and I look forward to the works being completed in a timely manner. I am happy to assist residents, should they have enquiries regarding these works. Required works are as follows: Sandblasting, replacing areas of corrosion, re-waterproofing the structure, painting"

"TII are responsible for this bridge and have identified the need to carry out a significant refurbishment of this bridge as a result of significant corrosion of the structure. It is proposed to remove the ramps to the footbridge around late March '24. As such there will only be pedestrian access over the footbridge via the stairs. A diversion route for cyclists will be put in place via Rathcoole Overbridge. On the 1st July '24 the stairs, main span and pylon will be removed off site for refurbishment. The intention is to have the main span and ramps back in place in early September. The closure of the footbridge from the 1st July will require a statutory notice and this process will be carried out in May. It will also be necessary to advise residents near Tay Lane of the upcoming works. A flyer will be circulated in the area in Mid March.

Approximate Timeline includes Late March: Remove ramps. April - June: Refurbishment of ramps. Late June: Remove main beam and stairs. July- August: Refurbishment of main beam. Early September: Transport ramps and main beam to site and re-erect. September-October: Refurbishment of stairs. And Early November: Transport stairs to site and re-erect.

GREATER FOCUS TO TENANT-IN-SITU DELAYS NEEDED

Less bureaucracy and greater expediency are necessary to support local authorities to secure more homes through the Tenant-in-Situ Scheme according to one South Dublin County councillor. Cllr. Derren Ó Brádaigh was speaking in view of recent figures that he received to an official question, that sought a detailed breakdown on the situation in relation to the scheme to date.

The councillor for Lucan and Palmerstown-Fonthill said "Whilst I welcome all purchases made to date and by my own local authority in South Dublin, I believe that Government needs to address some of the issues associated with the delays in progressing the end numbers to sale agreed more rapidly.

Ó Brádaigh said "At the end of December 2023, 514 expressions of interest had been received for potential acquisitions with 158 properties at varying stages of conveyance toward sale agreed. And whilst this represents very welcome progress and good work by the Council housing section, 142 properties will not proceed for various reasons. 62 of these are from within my own constituency in areas such as Lucan, Palmerstown and Clondalkin, all with large numbers of families on the housing list. Of course, it is essential that all houses being considered are fit for purpose and undergo due diligence and pre-purchase checks, however the fact remains that even after you remove the numbers that won't be progressed, there are still 57% going through different and lengthy stages of scrutiny.

Cllr Ó Brádaigh also stated "It really is a shame that the Minister for Housing, Darragh Ó Brien only came to see the urgency for the scheme amid much pressure before putting the scheme in place from April of last year. This came after repeated calls by Sinn Féin and only after the Government lifted the temporary ban on evictions

that had been in place, and in the face of spiralling numbers into homelessness. Unfortunately, and due to the wider failures by Government to address the crisis in housing, there is now a staggering 13,318 people experiencing homelessness, with 4,000 of these being children.

Ó Bradaigh concluded by saying "Government needs to provide more support and work to greater effect with all Councils to examine the Tenant-in-Situ Scheme in seeking to make it both more efficient and effective. Government failure to control the cost of purchasing a new home anywhere in the country is making it difficult for Councils to compete with the market. I also believe that we need more personnel dedicated to housing procurement to assist in processing the applications. Ultimately, we need delivery of large numbers of social and affordable homes and until this happens, I think we will continue to tinker around the edges."





END OF GARDAÍ SURGE FUNDING IN DUBLIN 'OUTRAGEOUS'

TD for Dublin Mid-West, Mark Ward, has criticised the government's decision to end surge policing funding in Dublin as 'outrageous'. The €10 million temporary funding unveiled by Minister Helen McEntee last year has now been spent and not renewed.

However, many people locally in Dublin have been expressing concerns that a lack of visible policing means they and their families don't feel safe and protected.

"The latest figures show that there are just 705 Gardaí in

Western. This is a decrease of nearly 10% since 2011. This also comes at a time when the local population in Dublin Mid-West is increasing, so in real terms this represents a drastic decrease. "Sinn Féin have brought forward proposals to properly fund and resource the Gardaí here in Dublin Mid-West. This would make a real difference for communities here and ensure they can feel safe.

APPLICATIONS FOR STUDENT ACCOMMODATION IN THE REGIONS OPEN UNDER NEW STUDENT **ACCOMMODATION POLICY**

Senator Seery Kearney has welcomed the publication of the long-term student accommodation plan by Minister Simon Harris. The plan commits funding for universities to build student accommodation, repurpose vacant buildings for housing and the continued promotion of digs for homeowners and students.

Crucially, the plan confirms applications for student accommodation projects from the five Technological Universities are now open. Senator Seery Kearney: "Housing is our greatest challenge and Fine Gael is determined to deliver housing for all. "This new policy confirms the Government will invest in the building of student accommodation across the country. "This plan commits to building student accommodation in the regions, in towns across this country.

"Fine Gael has led the Technological University agenda, placing universities in towns across the country. "Now we take it to the next phase ensuring they have student housing on site. This will encourage more people to stay in their regions and could attract students across the country to come study in towns like Dublin." Each Technological University will now be written to and asked for plans by the end of March.

Under this new student accommodation policy; The Government will fund the construction of purpose built student accommodation; Technological Universities to be enabled to build student accommodation in regions across the country; Funding will be provided to repurpose vacant properties into housing for students; Funding will be provided on basis a portion of beds will be ringfenced for students with a household income of €100,000. And continued support of the digs scheme with local authority and medical card changes to come into effect.

Speaking recently, Minister Harris said: "I am delighted to confirm Government has agreed a long-term policy on student accommodation. "This policy will help increase the supply of student housing in campuses across the country but will also help prevent students competing with families for private rental accommodation. "This vision and policy will inform a new Student Accommodation Policy, which will be published later this year."

MOTORING LIFE WITH **AUDI Q8 E-TRON – ELECTRIFICATION** VISUALISED

By Breda Corrigan

The new Audi Q8 e-tron is essentially a mid-life update of the mighty e-tron SUV that was first launched in 2019, and its new name is part of Audi's latest naming strategy which categorises their models in terms of their size and status. In this mid-cycle upgrade, the Q8 e-tron has received a dynamic new front design The Q8 e-tron model linethat incorporates a new grille with an illuminated strip that sits above it, along with a substantial range boost thanks to larger batteries and more power.

Generous Space.

In terms of size, the Q8 e-tron is longer and wider than the Audi Q5 mid-size SUV but smaller than the seven-seat Q7 SUV. There are two rows of seats, with very generous rear legroom for three fully-grown adults. Foot space is excellent courtesy of a flat floor that does without the traditional central tunnel in the floor of internal combustion engine (ICE) cars. The closest luxurious electric SUV rivals to the Q8 e-tron include the

Jaguar I-Pace, Tesla Model X, BMW iX and the Mercedes-Benz EQC and EQS. The Q8 e-tron is available with a choice of two body styles a traditional SUV (as tested) or a sleek Sportback version - both of which are offered with the same trim levels and powertrains.

Battery Capacity & Range.

up starts with the Q8 50 e-tron which gets a pair of electric motors for quattro all-wheel driveability, and a 89kWh usable battery. The mid-range Q8 55 e-tron benefits from a power boost and an even bigger battery with a usable capacity of 106kWh. Finally, serving as a replacement for the e-tron S is the SQ8 e-tron, which uses three electric motors to produce 496hp and a massive 973Nm of torque, powered by the same 106kWh battery as the Q8 55 e-tron. Official WLTP driving range figures for the 50 e-tron, 55 e-tron and SQ8 are 452km, 531km and 436km respectively. The Q8 e-tron's peak 170kW charge rate system makes good use of clever software management during charging

that ensures it accepts electricity swiftly. A suitable fast charger will top up the battery from 10-80% in just 28 minutes, with a full (0-100%) charge at a domestic wall-box charger taking around nine and a half hours to complete.

Three Trim Levels.

Three trim levels are available for the Q8 e-tron Advance, Sport and S Line - all of which come in 50 e-tron and 55 e-tron variants. The upmarket interior of the Q8 e-tron is packed full of Audi flavour, with a suite of advanced safety and infotainment tech as standard, along with a high-quality cabin that is adorned with premium materials throughout. The whole design follows the modern EV formula of being minimalistic in order to make the cabin feel as airy and spacious as possible. Infotainment is taken care of by way of Audi's dual-screen MMI system with MMI touch functionality. The 10.2inch upper screen provides access to the likes of vehicle settings, satellite navigation and telephone connectivity.





while the 8.6-inch lower screen is tasked with displaying features that a driver will interact with most often. The Audi Drive Select menu is accessed through the larger MMI screen, and drivers can select from offroad, all-road, comfort, auto, dynamic or individual drive modes to suit their individual driving style or road conditions.

Test Car.

My Audi Q8 e-tron 50 quattro test car came in top-spec S Line trim, and was finished in Daytona Grey Pearl Effect paintwork with upgraded 21" 5-arm Aero design wheels in black metallic in lieu of the standard-fit 21" turbine design wheels. Other key standard S Line equipment includes S Line bumpers in full paint finish, antitheft wheel bolts, ambient lighting package, Matrix LED headlights with dynamic automatically indicators, dimming rear-view mirror, central locking with 'Keyless Go', rear privacy glass, heated front seats with 4-way lumbar support, Valcona leather upholstery, inlays in matte brushed aluminium,

leather multi-function sports steering wheel, Audi Virtual Cockpit, navigation system, Audi Sound System, USB ports in rear, Audi Phone Box light, Audi pre-sense (front), camera-based traffic sign recognition, cruise control with speed limiter, lane departure warning, and a reversing camera. The steering wheel-mounted paddles allow drivers to control the level of brake regeneration, but it is also possible to just leave the car to work out what is best. The Q8 e-tron is supremely comfortable, refined and given its overall size surprisingly easy to drive. With guattro all-wheel drive as standard, the car feels very stable, whether it is cruising on a motorway or travelling along imperfect road surfaces in urban settings. The well-weighted steering communicates well with the driver, and the car can turn into a corner with terrific precision. With 340hp and 664Nm of instant torque on offer from the twin electric motors, the Q8 e-tron 50 can sprint from 0-100km/h in six seconds flat,

on its way to a top speed of

200km/h (where permitted).

Energy consumption as low as 20.3kWh/100km on a WLTP combined driving cycle equates to low running costs, while annual road tax is just €120. Families are sure to be impressed by the practical boot space in the Q8 e-tron, as it can be expanded from its 569-litre capacity behind the rear seats to a cavernous 1,637-litres when the rear seats are folded down.

Verdict & Pricing.

The new Audi Q8 e-tron impressively refined, is comfortable and beautifully built, and it is laden with cutting-edge tech. It is practical too, with lots of space in the luxurious cabin for up to 5 fully-grown adults, and ample boot space for their luggage. With its athletic and muscular profile, along with its terrific driving dynamics, the new Q8 e-tron is one of the best large premium SUVs on the market.

Pricing starts at €87,885 for the Q8 e-tron Advance 50 quattro, with my Q8 e-tron S Line 50 quattro test car specification priced from €97,390.

Workers are trying their hardest, doing long exhausting shifts and taking care of patients the best they can and I commend them. "However, the Government abandoned patients and workers when they made a deliberate decision to underfund the health service in the Budget and failed to make investments in capacity over the last three Budgets. Hospitals simply don't have the infrastructure that they need.

"It seems that Government has become immune to the unsafe, degrading, and

undignified experience many patients face in overcrowded hospitals. I agree entirely with Prof Conor Deasy, President of the Irish Association of Emergency Medicine. People deserve help in the right places when they need it. Patients who need emergency or urgent care should not put off attending hospital due to long waits, but the long waits need to be addressed. "Healthcare workers in Tallaght Hospital are trying their best but are working with one hand tied behind their back because they lack the bed, diagnostic, and theatre capacity that they need.

"The opportunity to build up capacity over the last four years has been squandered. We know there is a 1,000-bed deficit across the state, and that is reflect in the trolley figures on a daily basis and in tens of thousands of cancelled appointments every month. New figures show 26 people are waiting on trolleys and 10 people are waiting in wards for beds to become available. "The Government must urgently revise their budget for the health service in 2024 to target severe deficits - they must fund the promised 1500 hospital beds and deliver

ASSISTED HUMAN REPRODUCTION AMENDMENTS ESTABLISH CLEAR GUIDELINES FOR SURROGACY

The AHR legislation published recently provides a definite legal framework for future surrogacies - here in Ireland and abroad, according to a Dublin Senator. Senator Mary Seery-Kearney, who is the Seanad Spokesperson on Children, Disability, Equality, Integration and Youth said: "I welcome the amendments which will provide a clear process by which the parents of children born via surrogacy can ensure they will have life-long legal certainty in their relationship with their children. "As it stands, children born via surrogacy only have a right to a lifelong legal relationship with their biological father. This means that when they turn 18, their mother or in the case of same sex male couples, their second father becomes a stranger to them in the eyes of the law.

"These amendments come the statutory home care as a relief to families who have faced this kind of legal uncertainty as they grow their families. Now, they can be reassured that in a very short time their family relationships will be normalised legally. "This framework reflects the exceptional work of the Joint Oireachtas International Surrogacy Committee whose recommendations gave needed protections to women willing to become surrogates, the needs of children born via surrogacy and legal certainty to intending parents.

"Legislative safeguards and standards are crucial to protecting all parties involved. The new preconception authorisation process will ensure informed and voluntary participation in surrogacy. Yet, clarification will still need to be sought from the Minister on the confinement of payments to reasonable

expenses prevent restricting international avenues, surrogacy for especially same-sex couples with limited familybuilding options.

"I want to thank the members of the Interdepartmental Group from Health, Children and Justice, the respective Ministers and the advocacy Irish Families groups; through Surrogacy and Irish Gay Dads, who worked incredibly hard to bring the recommendations of the Committee to reality and who laid bare their struggles to illustrate the clear need for these amendments. The AHR Bill is currently at committee stage and will hopefully progress in a timely fashion through both Houses so that this framework can be on a statutory footing before the end of this term.

"As we re-examine the definition of the family in the upcoming referenda, I am reassured that those who might otherwise have fallen outside even a new enhanced definition will have access to the protections of the constitution."
