CALLS FOR AN OUTRIGHT BAN ON SINGLE-USE VAPES IN IRELAND

As the country marks 20 years since the introduction of the Smoking Ban, the Dublin MEP has written to the Minister for Health and the Minister for the Environment spelling out the opportunity to show the same courage and initiative in relation to vaping.

"While I welcome the recent ban on selling vapes to minors, it doesn't go nearly far enough. Efforts so far limit the use of vapes are not working. Walk down any street in cities and towns across Ireland and you quickly come across plastic vapes discarded on paths, roadsides, in parks, under trees and lamp posts, in canals and on beaches. It

"The fact that it is still perfectly legal to vape indoors in Ireland, in restaurants, bars and workplaces is totally unacceptable. I understand that banning vapes is a radical move. But we, in Ireland, are not afraid to take radical measures to protect future generations from the harmful impact of tobacco products. This week marks 20 years since Micheál Martin introduced the ground-breaking Smoking Ban, which has saved 1,500 lives every single year since its introduction. We can lead

"Disposable vapes contain lithium batteries which are highly toxic and harmful to the environment. When disposed of improperly. they leach toxic chemicals into the soil and water, posing a significant threat to our ecosystems. Most disposable vapes contain metals which can take years to decompose. They also contain plastic which never fully decomposes. It turns "microplastics," into tiny pieces of plastic, which continue to pollute the environment and pollute our food and drinking water.

"We are yet to fully understand the harmful impact of vaping on human health but the warning signs are stark. Research here in Ireland already shows that acute effects may include poisonings, burns, asthmatic attacks and stress to the brain, heart and lungs. The Irish Heart Foundation and the Irish Cancer Society have flagged the potential risks, particularly regarding lung inflammation and DNA damage.

"The time for tinkering around the edges of a ban has long-since passed. By failing to introduce an outright ban on these harmful products, we are walking younger generations into an environmental and health crisis that is entirely avoidable."





SDCC receipts from fines in 2023 was just under €24,000. This gives an actual litter fine collection rate of 39%. Not all fines would be paid for various reasons, e.g. if an alleged offender decided to contest a fine, provided evidence it wasn't them or maybe they have just ignored the fine and may be the subject of legal action yet to be decided."

"South Dublin Co Co currently employs 5 anti-litter wardens each assigned to a geographical area of the County. In relation to CCTV systems, there are currently no live systems in operation. The proposed amendments to the WASTE MGMT and litter pollution Act include provisions for the approval of CCTV schemes by local authorities, subject to conditions, for the purposes of deterring environmental pollution and facilitating the deterrence, prevention, detection, and prosecution of offences under the Act of 1996 or the Act of 1997." stated Cllr Gilligan.



COUNCIL TO AUDIT WHEELCHAIR ACCESSIBILITY

At the April council meeting South Dublin County Council agreed to produce an audit of all council owned buildings for wheelchair accessibility and accessible toilets. This was agreed after a motion proposed by People Before Profit Councillor Madeleine Johansson was passed. Council management also agreed to update information about accessibility on the council's website. Councillor Johansson had originally asked for an annual audit of buildings to be published on International Wheelchair Day 1st March, however council management said they wouldn't be able to do so "due to resource constraints".

Cllr Madeleine Johansson commented: "I'm happy that my motion was passed and that an audit of council owned buildings will be carried out. While accessibility is very good in many buildings such as County Hall and many of the libraries there are others such as community centres that don't have that.

"People with disabilities, and particularly wheelchair users, face a daily battle trying to do the simple things such as accessing buildings and public spaces. The council has a role to play to ensure that at the very least buildings owned by the council is accessible for everyone in our community regardless of ability. "I'm disappointed that the management wouldn't agree to an annual audit. This would have allowed detailed reporting every year to make sure that accessibility is improving in our public buildings. I'm committed to continue to fight for this in



23 YOUNG PEOPLE FROM ACROSS DUBLIN PARTICIPATE IN DÁIL NA NÓG 2024

Over 160 young delegates Comhairle na nÓg (local youth councils) across Ireland met in Dáil Éireann to debate the critical issue mental health, one the biggest topics of concern to young people Ireland, particularly since the pandemic. Mental health was identified by over 3,000 young people across Comhairle na nÓg as their priority issue for discussion in advance of the day, which they feel that the Government should do more to address. Shriya Mishra, Dun Laoghaire- Rathdown Comhairle na nÓg member addressed delgates during the opening ceremony.

The Minister for Children, Equality, Disability, Integration Youth, Roderic O'Gorman, said "I thank the Ceann Comhairle and the Houses of the Oireachtas Citizen Engagement Team for working with my Department to make Dáil na nÓg 2024 happen. I know that Minister Foley and her officials have engaged very positively with the outgoing National Executive on their topic of Relationships and Sexuality education

I am also grateful to Minister Butler for attending to hear directly about the mental

health issue selected by all the Comhairlí na nÓg for debate by their delegates to Dáil na nÓg. The incoming National Executive will work on this issue over their two year term, and the support of Minister Butler and officials in the Department of Health will be a critical element in the impact they can have.'

na nÓg, Ireland's National Youth Parliament, now in its 22nd year, tackled a range of issues related to mental health, including body image, school stress, and mental health services. The biennial parliament, which provides a platform for young people to speak about and make recommendations on the issues that most affect them, was hosted by the Ceann Comhairle, Seán Ó Fearghaíl, who chaired the Opening Session in the Dáil Chamber. There were closing remarks in the chamber from Minister of State for Mental Health & Older People, Mary Butler.

Delegates from Comhairle na nÓg - representing each of the 31 local authorities across Ireland - filled the committee rooms in Leinster House where they took part in workshops to debate the three mental health topics.

Discussions around how mental health affects the lives of young people in their communities and what changes need to be implemented to address these challenges and improve the experiences of young people in Ireland. Following a formal vote in the afternoon where delegates processed through the lobbies of the Dáil, school stress was selected as the priority topic. This will inform the work of the incoming Comhairle na nÓg National Executive 2024-2026, who are tasked with advocating for policy change in this area during their tenure.

Previous years' themes have included equality, climate education, transport. 2022's delegation voted for 'A more inclusive Relationships and Sexuality Education' as the priority topic. To progress this the National Executive 2022-2024 contributed their views to two National Council for Curriculum and Assessment submissions, attended table discussions hosted by the NCCA on the content, and conducted surveys with Comhairle na nÓg members. They have also invited and taken part in discussions with relevant

experts in the field from the Department of Education, Dublin City University, the Health Promotion Research Centre and the World Health Organisation. They have made a proposal to the Department of Education who welcomed their work and committed to consider ways in which to implement their recommendations.

Chairing the debate, Ceann Comhairle Seán Ó Fearghaíl, told those gathered: "The young people gathered in the chamber are a powerful force for change. At a time when parts of the world are in turmoil with war, hunger and the devastation of climate change, it is you who hold the keys to your own future. Your discussions today on the themes of Mental Health, Body Image and School Stress will evoke thoughts and compassion for your peers and colleagues. If there is one thing I would encourage you to do in this Chamber today, it is to listen completely. When you listen you play one part of the conversation. The golden rule of being a good speaker is to be a good listener."

In her closing remarks to delegates, Minister of State for Mental Health & Older People Mary Butler added:

"I was really pleased to listen and engage with 160 articulate young people across all 31 Comhairle na nÓg. The voice of younger people must be heard and listened to, particularly on issues such as youth mental health. I want to thank each and every one of these young people for the valuable contributions they are making to society. As advocates representing young people across Ireland, I have heard your voices today and I share your vision for improvement and progress, especially in relation to signposting services that are available for young people to support their emotional wellbeing and to support positive mental health. I am familiar with the fantastic work that Comhairle na nÓg do. Our young people are the future leaders and it great to see them here in the Dáil chamber today discussing such an important topic."

Dáil na nÓg is organised by the Department of Children, Equality, Disability, Integration and Youth in association with members of Houses of the Oireachtas and Government. Dáil na nÓg is an initiative of the Department for Children, Equality, Disability, Integration and Youth and was first established in 2001. The topic of school stress voted on at Dáil na nÓg will form the basis of the incoming Comhairle na

nÓg National Executive's formal workplan for the next two years. The National Executive is made up of one representative from each of the 31 Comhairlí na nÓg and follows up on the recommendations from Dáil na nÓg to make changes for young people in those areas. The National Executive has a term of office of two years and meets once a month, and is facilitated and supported by the National Participation Office and the Department Equality. Children. Disability, Integration and Youth who ensure that they get the opportunity to engage with appropriate Ministers. policy-makers. Oireachtas Committees and other decision-makers.

Minister O'Gorman further said "I am very pleased that Dáil na nÓg sat in the Dáil chamber, with delegates from each of the 31 Comhairle na nÓg local youth councils. This youth parliament convenes every two years and is an important way for members of the Houses of the Oireachtas and Government to hear directly from children and young people on the priority issues that need to be addressed. I have been very happy to support and promote the voice of children and young people in Government decision-making and applaud the young people who have come here today to advance this important work."

NEW VW ID.3 OFFERS STYLISH SUSTAINABILITY



The new ID.3 continues to advance electric mobility at Volkswagen. The clear lines of the exterior give the new ID.3 a more mature look, and the interior is characterised by high-quality materials, while numerous assistance systems are included as standard features. While it was very well received by Irish EV buyers at launch, the original ID.3 was let down by indifferent material quality, a clunky infotainment system and cumbersome controls, but the revised ID.3 promises to address these issues.

Upmarket Look & Feel.

In order to address the first issue, the new ID.3 features upgraded materials throughout the cabin, with the most obvious areas to receive attention being the seats, dashboard and door trims - all of which was done in an effort to create a more upmarket interior look and feel. The infotainment system now features VW's latest software, and this makes the system more user-friendly and guicker to respond to commands than before, with the central touchscreen display now offering even greater clarity and higher resolution. As before, there are very few physical buttons on the dashboard, with most functions controlled courtesy of the infotainment screen or with voice commands. Touch-sensitive slider controls for adjusting the media volume and interior temperature are still located at the bottom of the touchscreen, and are relatively easy to use when on the move. The revised ID.3 benefits from a light reworking of the exterior, which provides the car with a more cohesive overall appearance that does without the black plastic trim that featured on the bonnet of the original model. Other exterior tweaks include a reprofiled front bumper and a revised rear light cluster. The

ID.3's microfibre seat upholstery is made from 71% recycled materials and no animal-derived products are used inside at all.

Four Trim Levels.

There are 4 trim levels available in the new ID.3: Pro, Pro Plus, Pro S, and top-spec Pro S Plus. Key standard features in entry-level Pro trim includes; adaptive cruise control with speed limiter, Keyless-Go central locking with SAFELOCK, armrests for both front seats, 10-colour ambient lighting, central control unit, Climatronic air-conditioning, DAB radio, driver alert system, drive profile selection, electric auxiliary air heater, electrically-operated and power-folding door mirrors, heat-insulating windscreen, heated washer nozzles, high beam control (Light Assist), LED headlamps, LED rear combination lamps, leather steering wheel, mobile phone interface, Park Distance Control (parking sensors), Natural Voice Control, lane keeping assist, 'Play' & 'Pause' foot pedals, private emergency call system, sound deadening package, Wired & Wireless App Connect, dynamic road sign display, and manual height adjustment for the front seats, along with ISOFIX child seat anchorage points on outer rear seats and on the front passenger seat with airbag deactivation. Enhanced levels of functional equipment, comfort and assistance packages come as standard on a varying scale across the other ID.3 trim levels, and a host of optional extra packages are available for buyers looking for ultimate personalisation.

Impressive Power & Range.

Power comes from the same permanent magnet synchronous electric motor as before, with power provided to the rear

wheels via a single-speed transmission. Pro and Pro Plus versions of the ID.3 come with a 58kWh battery with a range of up to 428km, while Pro S and Pro S Plus versions benefit from a bigger 77kWh battery with a range of up to 557km from a full charge. Producing 204hp and 310Nm of torque, the ID.3 58kWh can sprint from 0-100km/h in just 7.4-seconds, with the slightly heavier 77kWh versions taking just 0.5-seconds longer to reach 100km/h. The ID.3 can achieve a full charge (0-100%) via a domestic wallbox charger (11kW) in approximately 7.5 hours, while a 5-80% charge at a DC public fast-charging station can be completed in as little as 30 minutes.

Test Car Details.

My ID.3 Pro S 77kWh test car looked stunning in its Dark Olivine Green metallic paintwork with a contrasting black roof and black door mirror covers, along with its optional 20" Sanya alloy wheels in lieu of the standard 19" Wellington alloys that come as standard. Additional standard Pro S equipment includes heated front seats, unsplit rear seat bench with a split-folding backrest and a centre armrest, 4 seats (2 up front and two at rear), and a front passenger-side exterior mirror lowering function (when reverse gear is engaged). As before, the regenerative braking function is accessed by pressing the B mode button on the gear selector, which is still conveniently located on the end of the 5.3-inch digital instrument display. The high seating position allows for excellent outward vision, and the flat floor provides above-class-average levels of accommodation for all occupants, with impressive leg and headroom throughout. Boot capacity measures in at a respectable 385-litres with the rear seats in place, but

this can be expanded to 1.267-litres when the rear setbacks are folded down. The ID.3 feels equally at home on a twisty back road as it does on a fast-moving motorway, as the well-damped chassis provides impressive body control, irrespective of the road surface. The car responds swiftly when then accelerator pedal is pressed and its nimble steering set-up operates in a light and precise fashion. The original ID.3 was known for its predictable and dependable handling characteristics, and the revised ID.3 also excels in that respect, while its impressive refinement, comfortable ride quality and competent driving dynamics ensure it remains one of the best electric hatchbacks on sale. With 'We Connect digital services', drivers can transform their ID.3 into a connected car, as the built-in SIM card can connect it to the internet on request. In addition, the 'We Connect ID smartphone app' provides the driver with important information about their car even when on the move. For example, you can check the remaining range, or if all of the doors and windows are closed, along with the option to start and stop charging, and adjust the air-conditioning system to your individual preference.

Verdict & Pricing.

With the introduction of the revised ID.3, it is clear to see that Volkswagen has succeeded in addressing the shortcomings of the first generation car. The minor tweaks that the revised ID.3 has received will undoubtedly boost its appeal even further than before. The new VW ID.3 is priced from just €37,112 (after state subsidies, and inclusive of delivery & service plan). Price as tested (excluding extras fitted to test car) is €42,440.

FUNDING MUST BE ALLOCATED FOR EATING DISORDER SERVICES

Mark Ward TD has called on the Minister for Health to invest additional funding into eating disorder services for 2024. Deputy Ward was speaking after receiving a parliamentary question response from the HSE which highlighted the need for additional eating disorder teams.

Teachta Ward said "I have received a response from the HSE to say there is a need for 6 additional eating disorder teams nationally to complete the eating disorder network. "The National Clinical Programme for eating Disorders is now waiting on funding to be announced in the HSE national service plan. "The National Model of Care for Eating Disorders was published by the HSE in 2018. It aimed to establish 8 adult and 8 CAMHS eating disorder teams, that would form the eating disorder network. "There are currently 11 teams in operation, but many have not been fully staffed due to the pause on recruitment. Only 80% of positions have been filled to date. The pause on recruitment needs to be lifted and the additional teams delivered.

"There was no additional funding announced to advance these teams in the 2023. "To date no additional funding has been allocated to eating disorders is 2024 mental health budgets. "Sinn Fein in Government would fully fund the National Clinical Programme for Eating Disorders as

laid out in our alternative budget. "There is still an opportunity for the Minister for Health towards the end of his term to allocate additional funding for the development of 2-3 additional teams this year. This was the pace at which the model of care set out to achieve its network of teams and had funding been allocated in the last two years, the network would have been fully established.

"Specialist Eating Disorder teams have been associated with faster recovery, higher patient satisfaction, lower costs, lower rates of inpatient admission and better case identification and to find out there is no additional funding this year is very concerning. "Eating disorders have the highest mortality of any psychiatric diagnosis. "There are currently only 3 public inpatient beds for adults with eating disorders in the state. I have highlighted previously that there is no plan currently to extend that number.

"It has been 6 years since the Model of Care Plan for Eating Disorders was published and yet the Government is doing nothing to deliver on this. "This Model of Care was originally a five-year plan, to be implemented by 2023. "The time for planning has passed, now we need action. Minister Donnelly now must fund these plans and deliver on his promises."


