SOSAD also offer support and services for people who are struggling with suicidal ideation, self-harm, depression, bereavement, stress and anxiety.

Teachta Ward said "A vital suicide prevention service may have to close its doors this Christmas due to a lack of funding. "In October, Deputy Darren O'Rourke and I, along with other colleagues, met members of Save Our Sons and Daughters, SOSAD. Since 2007 this organisation has

"SOSAD has seven offices, based in Cavan, Louth, Meath, Monaghan and Laois. Up to October the organisation had seen 1,600 individual clients and

delivered 18,000 counselling sessions. "I was informed that SOSAD would have to close their doors this year, due to funding issues, with only a couple of months left in the year. It does not receive any statutory funding.

"The representatives said that they contacted the Minister of State's office a couple of times and told to contact the HSE. That is where the barrier seems to be. When they go to the HSE, the HSE simply does not want to know.

"I raised this on the floor of

the Dáil and Minister Butler committed to meeting with the group, which she did at the beginning of November. "To date, none of the commitments that the Minister made at the meeting, were acted upon according to SOSAD. There has been no further contact from Minister Butler.

"SOSAD have been in contact with me again out of desperation. I have written to the Minister and have asked that treat this with the urgency that it deserves. "This is a vital service and cannot be closed due to a lack of urgency."

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PASSAGE OF MOTION TO COMPULSORILY PURCHASE DERELICT PROPERTIES WELCOMED

People Before Profit Councillor Madeleine Johansson has expressed approval of her motion her delight following the at the December meeting



of South Dublin County Council, which calls for the Chief Executive to initiate Compulsory Purchase Orders (CPOs) on all properties listed on the Derelict Sites Register.

This motion is part of a broader effort to tackle the housing crisis by bringing long-neglected properties back into use. Cllr. Johansson hailed the decision as “a small but significant step towards addressing the urgent need for housing and revitalizing our communities.”

In her speech during the council meeting, Cllr. Johansson emphasized the gravity of the housing crisis and the responsibility of local authorities to act decisively. She stated: “This motion is asking the Chief Executive to initiate Compulsory Purchase Orders on all the sites on the Derelict Sites Register. It is a disgrace that we continue to have homes left vacant and derelict, no matter the reason, during

a housing emergency. We have nearly 15,000 people in emergency accommodation, tens of thousands living in overcrowded houses, and across the country, over 160,000 vacant homes. We cannot afford to stand by.”

The motion builds on existing efforts outlined in the Council’s report, which noted progress in acquiring and restoring derelict properties under the Derelict Sites Act. Currently, 23 sites are listed on the register, with ongoing actions that have already seen some properties refurbished, sold, or reoccupied. However, Cllr. Johansson stressed that

these efforts fall short of meeting the pressing need. “I welcome the actions already taken, but the target of 30 set by the government is wholly inadequate. This council must do more to meet and exceed that target to address the scale of the crisis,” she added.

Cllr. Johansson reaffirmed her commitment to holding the council accountable for delivering on this motion and ensuring swift implementation. She concluded that “People Before Profit will continue to lead the charge for bold, meaningful action to resolve the housing crisis.”

With this project, TUHF aims to support Tallaght University Hospital to revolutionize the landscape of healthcare, setting new standards in patient treatment and care.”

The facility will be strategically located near the Tallaght University Hospital campus, with the two connected by a pedestrian crossing. The

development will also include new footpaths, bike racks and accessible parking. Douglas added: “This facility is poised to become a national leader in healthcare

innovation and TUHF is very excited to drive the Innovate Health, Centre of Excellence in Brain Health and Dementia project forward throughout 2025.”

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APPLICATIONS INVITED UNDER THE FIFTH TEXACO SUPPORT FOR SPORT INITIATIVE

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DECISION NOT TO FUND REDEVELOPMENT OF NATIONAL BASKETBALL ARENA 'EXTREMELY DISAPPOINTING'

TD for Dublin South West Seán Crowe has said that it is extremely disappointing that government has chosen not to support the redevelopment of the National Basketball Arena through the Large Scale Sport Infrastructure Fund. Crowe said that this is especially disappointing given the speed at which basketball in Ireland is growing as a sport and the massive boost this would have given the local area.

Seán Crowe said "I was delighted when South Dublin County Council granted the planning for the redevelopment of the National Basketball Arena

into a world class facility. I thought it would be a no brainer for the government to support this project in any way they could. "It was incredibly disappointing to hear them from the CEO of Basketball Ireland recently that they were unsuccessful in getting support from the Large Scale Sport Infrastructure Fund, the fund specifically set up for these kinds of projects.

"Basketball is the fastest growing sport in Ireland. It provides health benefits, social interaction and outdoor courts can be set up reasonably cheaply. We should be encouraging this

sport as much as possible and that includes by supporting the redevelopment of the National Arena into a facility that can be a beacon to attract more young people to the sport.

"Ireland is increasingly a more difficult country for young people to grow up in. That is why we would significantly increase the investment in sport, including an annual increase of €55m to the Large Scale Sport Infrastructure Fund so that we can have the world class facilities that Irish athletes need so that we can drive on sports like basketball."

DUBLIN FARMER CONTRIBUTES TO NEW BOOK ON SUSTAINABLE FARMING



Irish farmers including Olly Nolan, have joined forces for a new book combining scientific research with local knowledge that gives farmers and others practical tips on how to create a more sustainable future, while protecting land and nature. At a time of great challenge and uncertainty for farm families, The Farming For Nature Handbook is a practical guide to protecting and restoring nature. With contributions from more than 50 Irish farmers, the book also shares farmers' experiences of how working with nature can help reduce costs and improve incomes.

While there is widespread awareness of the environmental damage caused by poor farming practices, this book in contrast attempts to highlight the positive ways farmers can sustain and enhance our natural environment, and benefit from the results. It is hoped The Farming For Nature Handbook will become the essential guide to caring profitably for our land.

The book launched on November 28th, was inspired by regular requests to the non-profit Farming For Nature project from landowners, farmers, smallholders and growers wanting to learn how best to manage their land, big or small, in a way that enhances habitats, protects profits, and safeguards our natural environment and rural communities. The Farming For Nature project was set up to support, encourage and inspire farmers who farm, or who wish to farm, in a way that will improve the natural health of our countryside.

Olly Nolan, a mixed stock farmer from Glenasmole, is one of the contributors and shares his views on sustainable farming in the book. He says "It's very important to remember that in Ireland we have over 100 species of bee and the honeybee is only one of them. So, I'm always conscious of not having too many colonies of honey bee in one area. Too many beehives would also end up competing with all these other important pollinators who are also under pressure due to loss of habitat and pesticide use."

The Farming For Nature Handbook shares tips for a better farming future and shows how to manage land in a way that enhances habitats, increases wildlife and harnesses natural processes while protecting livelihoods, food security and profiles. It is not just targeted at farmers but is for anyone who wants to grow, garden and gather better. The book was conceived and developed by Brigid Barry, researched and

mainly written by conservation ecologist Dr. Emma Hart on behalf of Farming For Nature and co-edited by Dr. Brendan Dunford of the Burrenbeo Trust. It is beautifully illustrated with watercolours and sketches by farmer and artist Clive Bright as well as digital images by scientific illustrator William Helps. The book has been described by President of Ireland Michael D Higgins as "a timely and essential contribution to the on-going discourse on how we, as a society, must respond to some of the most pressing challenges of our time".

The Farming For Nature Handbook, published by Dingle Publishing has a RRP of €30 and is available to order at www.farmingfornature.ie. The book was supported financially by the National Parks and Wildlife Service, the Department of Agriculture, Food and the Marine, and the Lifes2Good Foundation.

Commenting, Farming For Nature Manager and co-founder Brigid Barry said "There is a massive gap in the market for this book - an easy-to-access toolkit to help tackle the biodiversity and climate crises. We hope it gets into every jeep and tractor in the countryside to guide farmers in these tricky times. Many farmers start by making small changes. Then, as they join a like-minded community and begin to experience the value of nature returning to their farms, they don't look back. Nature unleashes your land's full potential."

Farming For Nature co-founder Dr. Brendan Dunford said "Two thirds of our countryside is owned and managed by farmers, and we view these farmers as potentially a huge resource in addressing the biodiversity crisis that Ireland faces today. This has seen declines in most of our habitats and species - for instance, it's estimated that we've lost 30% of our semi-natural grasslands in only one decade. To mobilise these 'farmers for nature' we need better funding but also better guidance, and this handbook will hopefully help inform the journey ahead towards a more sustainable future for our wonderful landscapes and those who farm them."

Conservation scientist and co-author Dr. Emma Hart added "At a time of profound loss—of clean water, healthy soil, and our native wildlife—the Farming For Nature Handbook is both a message of hope and a call to action. It shows how each of us can take charge of the health and vitality of the landscapes we inhabit, and help shift the dial toward a brighter, more resilient future."

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VW TOUAREG 'R' EHYBRID IS FAST & FRUGAL

The new Touareg 'R' eHybrid is the hottest version of Volkswagen's large, all-wheel drive SUV, and it is currently the most powerful Volkswagen ever made. Producing a hefty 462bhp and 700Nm of torque, it is capable of sprinting from 0-100km/h in just 5.2-seconds, on its way to a top speed of 250km/h (where permitted). By selecting 'E mode', drivers can experience all-electric driving at speeds of up to 140km/h with a sufficiently-charged battery, and the 14.3kWh battery provides the electric motor with enough power to cover up to 50km on electric power alone. Now in its third-generation, the new version of VW's high-tech flagship SUV represents the continuation of a now tried, tested and proven concept, and it represents the symbiosis of high performance and electric efficiency.

Sporty, Understated Design.

The new Touareg R eHybrid version takes the elegant look of its predecessor and enhances it even further, as the iconic appearance of the new model is extended with carefully selected design elements. Additionally, the standard 'Black Style' design package affords

the Touareg a stylish presence in a premium, understated look. Exterior highlights include IQ.Light HD matrix headlights in a new 6-lens design with a new signature light element, a new front grille with a horizontal light strip, new boot lid with LED light design with dynamic indicators, an illuminated rear Volkswagen logo, R-specific blue brake callipers with 'R' logo, a 'Black Style' exterior package, and the choice of two new colours: Chili Red and Silicone Grey Matt. Cabin occupants will appreciate the upgraded interior equipment with R-specific differentiation, along with soft door trims for a higher quality look and feel, atmospheric ambient light with individual lighting options, and an Innovision Cockpit with a large 15-inch display that features a new infotainment system as standard. The navigation system has also been updated with more detailed maps and more conversational voice control. The most obvious change inside the cabin is the new steering wheel, complete with touch-sensitive controls. The high-quality cabin is refined and reassuringly solid, with lots of soft-touch materials used throughout. There is plenty of room for front and rear seat

passengers, and the boot has a cargo capacity of 665-litres behind the rear seats, with this figure increasing to 1,675-litres with the rear seats folded.

Five-Star Safety.

The new Touareg gets more standard safety systems than any other VW product, with cutting-edge sensors and safety features ready to protect occupants in the event of a crash, as well as systems designed to stop a crash happening in the first place. The regular Volkswagen Touareg achieved a full five-star safety rating when it was tested by Euro NCAP.

Test Car Details.

My test car was a Touareg 'R' eHybrid, which was finished in Grenadilla Black Metallic paintwork, with optional 21-inch 'Leeds' diamond-turned black alloy wheels, and it looked stunning in the Autumnal sunshine. The mighty 3.0-litre V6 petrol engine works in conjunction with the electric motor and battery pack to produce outstanding performance and, whether driving around town or cruising along a motorway, driver

enjoyment is guaranteed. When driving on electric power alone, the result is smooth and silent progression and, even when the petrol engine cuts in, the silence isn't spoiled. However, under harsh acceleration, the engine becomes vaguely vocal, but the beautiful sound of the 3.0-litre engine is pleasingly addictive. The Touareg 'R' eHybrid comes with self-levelling, height-adjustable air suspension, and it proves truly beneficial when it comes to overall ride comfort. Road surface imperfections and speed ramps can be tackled with ease, and even larger potholes are isolated with incredible composure. Tight body control ensures minimal body roll through sharp bends, and the nicely-weighted steering is accurate and responsive. For such a large SUV, the Touareg handles neatly and it feels well connected to the road at all times. The high-set driving position (with multiple electric-adjustment options) provides terrific all-round visibility, and the standard front and rear parking sensors, along with front and rear cameras, make parking a doddle. The 3.0-litre TFSI petrol engine in union with the Plug-in Hybrid (PHEV) system has a combined

emission figure of 48g/km, and this results in annual road tax of just €140. Similarly impressive is the official combined fuel consumption figure of 2.3l/100km, but this greatly depends on a number of factors, such as whether every journey is undertaken with a fully-charged battery, along with road conditions, weather conditions and individual driving style. As the flagship model in Volkswagen's passenger car line-up, the regular Touareg literally wants for nothing in terms of comfort, convenience, safety, security, connectivity and infotainment features, but the additional sporty design elements and standard equipment found in the 'R' eHybrid make it extra-special in every way.

Verdict & Pricing.

The new Volkswagen Touareg 'R' eHybrid is a highly commendable large SUV that provides drivers with sports car-rivalling performance, impressive cabin and boot space, an outstanding array of standard features, and the realistic running costs associated with an advanced petrol/electric hybrid powertrain. The Touareg 'R' eHybrid is priced from €103,050 (ex-delivery).

COUNCIL'S OVER RELIANCE ON OUTSOURCING LEADS TO MAINTENANCE FAILURES

People Before Profit has called out South Dublin County Council's reliance on outsourcing for the repair and maintenance of council homes, labelling it inefficient and costly. Figures obtained from South Dublin County Council show that nearly half of the Council's 2024 maintenance and refurbishment budget—€10.22 million of €20.47 million— is allocated to outsourced services.

People Before Profit Councillors Madeleine Johansson and Darragh Adelaide shared insights from their direct interactions with council tenants. "We've spoken with numerous tenants who have been waiting months for contractors to handle essential repairs, only to find that work is often subpar, requiring additional fixes. Residents are left in unacceptable living conditions due to prolonged waiting periods due to reliance on outsourced labour.

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ONLY 3 IN 10 DEVICES RECYCLED IN DUBLIN

Almost half of Ireland's small electronics are bought in November and December, but Dublin is lagging in recycling rates, with only three in ten devices returning to the

circular economy, new data reveals. The Waste Electrical and Electronic Equipment (WEEE) Ireland figures show that nationally, over 11 million

small electronic items were bought last year, with 4.4 million sold during Black Friday and Christmas alone. However, Dublin's recycling trends show that most of 3 in 10 of these items won't be recycled when they can no longer be repaired or reused. The recycling rate is even worse for toys such as gaming consoles and battery-operated action figures, falling to just 10% nationally, leaving millions of devices lying in drawers or discarded irresponsibly.

With 73% of Irish consumers now shopping online, WEEE Ireland is urging Dublin residents to embrace sustainable habits by swapping old for new responsibly.

"Electronics are a top category in online purchases,

particularly during high-sales periods like Black Friday and Christmas when cost-conscious consumers hunt for deals," said Elizabeth O'Reilly, Head of Environmental Compliance at WEEE Ireland. "However, recycling rates in Dublin for small devices remain low, particularly for online purchases, despite the availability of free take back services for recycling from the likes of Amazon. "With the holiday shopping season in full swing, it's more important than ever for consumers to know their options. "Whether you shop in-store or online, every retailer is required under Irish legislation to accept obsolete devices for free recycling when selling a similar new one."

Ms O'Reilly says WEEE

Ireland is encouraging people to check their retailers' take back policies as each offers different ways to return items for recycling. "Some online retailers offer collection services with their own delivery services and others offer options for free postal or courier return.

Then, if you simply swap while you shop, you recycle your defunct device to ensure it doesn't end up in landfill. "This small action can make a big impact, helping conserve finite resources while reducing environmental harm, as well as protecting human and animal health."

WEEE Ireland's tips for a more sustainable Black Friday and Christmas Recycle while you buy: Take advantage of free recycling when purchasing

new devices; Opt for refurbished: Explore nearly new and refurbished device offerings, and related trade-in offers, when looking for replacement items. Repair first: Extend the life of your gadgets by repairing them before replacing; Reuse and share: Pass on functioning electronics in good quality to others who may need them; Recycle responsibly: Use authorised WEEE Ireland collection points for broken devices beyond repair and reuse.

WEEE Ireland offers hundreds of collection points across local authority civic amenity centres, allowing consumers to drop off old electronic devices for free. Participating online and physical retailers are also part of its nationwide effort to combat e-waste.

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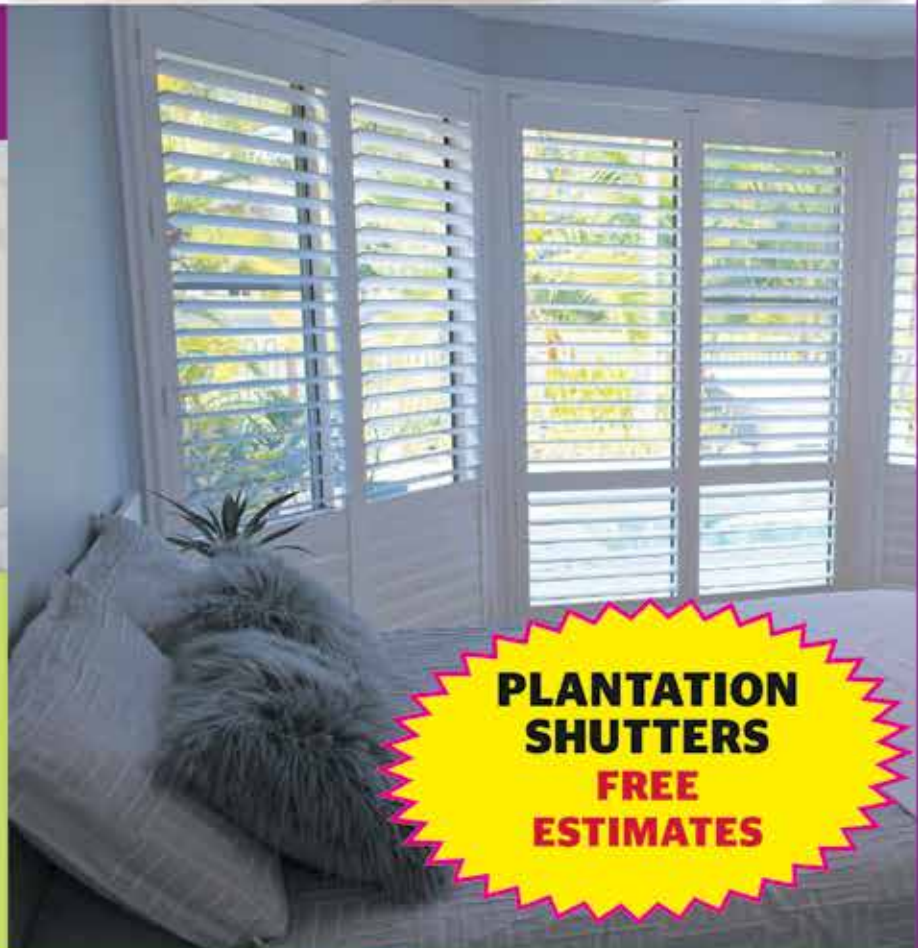
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
